Surrounded By Suffering

When people first come into St. Ignatius Loyola Church, the overall beauty of the space strikes them. Only gradually do they notice the individual elements of that beauty: the vault of the central ceiling, its supporting granite monoliths, the multiple domes of the side aisles, the mosaics, the Tiffany glass, the organ case, the works done in bronze, the grandeur of its statues and altars.

Some people at first do not realize that the principal decorations on the side walls of the church are large, mosaic Stations of the Cross, action scenes from the Passion of Christ. While they conspicuously line the walls of our beautiful Church, one can easily overlook these scenes of Christ's suffering. Yet, in our church space we are literally surrounded by images of suffering: the abusive use of power, the crushing of the innocent, unjust death, the helplessness of the compassionate, deliberate demeaning, dying and death.

How is it that we so easily forget these depictions of terrible suffering that surround us? Does our familiarity erode our sensibilities?

Just imagine if we were surrounded, not just by the sight, but also the sounds that accompany the events depicted: the jeers, the cries of pain, the sobs of grief, the thud of heavy wood striking the ground, and the ring of hammers on nails.

But the stations make no sound. They appeal only to sight, and the sight of our Stations is beautiful. We can grow comfortable surrounded by the sight of suffering. We can take it for granted. Must beauty anesthetize us from the realities depicted? No, this cannot be the case, for if it were, beauty would be in the service of a lie. Rather, this beauty, which depicts such suffering, points beyond itself to a greater truth.

Christian realism acknowledges the suffering in our world, and Christian faithfulness to Christ requires us to do whatever we can to end that suffering. But only Christian hope offers a vision that can integrate suffering with beauty. For Christian hope trusts in the providential love of God and maintains that all the evils suggested by the Stations of the Cross are integrated into a greater and more powerfully beautiful vision of reality. It is a vision formed by faith in the goodness of God. We believe that in union with Christ all human suffering is a part of that Paschal mystery which culminates in never-ending Resurrection.

The comfort we feel in a beautiful space, even one surrounded with images of suffering, can be a sign of Christian hope and of confidence in God's providential love.

At the same time, however, human suffering remains a terrible evil, and the sight of actual human beings suffering surrounds us daily. The emotionally troubled, the cold and hungry homeless, the sick and addicted fill our streets. The frail elderly are isolated and imprisoned in their apartments. As followers of Christ, we cannot allow ourselves to become comfortable in these surroundings. We must advert to their pain and do what we can to alleviate it. It cries out to us and, for Christ's sake, must be heard.

When was the last time we prayed the Stations of the Cross? When have we just walked through the church and stopped briefly to reflect on the scenes of Christ's Passion depicted there?

We can pray the Stations at any time, but Lent is a particularly good time for us to turn our attention to the suffering of Christ, and Lent is approaching fast. It is only a little more than two weeks away. Perhaps, as we pray the Stations in our beautiful church, we might become more aware of the suffering which surrounds us in our city and learn to see it without looking away—and to act to alleviate it without growing discouraged.


About The Ladybug Fund
