
A Holy Noise!

am occasionally asked to explain the rather significant investment our parish makes in music, and I am always the first to acknowledge

that the outlay in terms of financial and personnel resources is substantial. We provide music at all six weekend Masses throughout the year, which number close to 350. This doesn't include Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week, and various feasts such as All Saints, Ascension, and others. All told, we have approximately 375 regularly scheduled Masses per year requiring music, all of them staffed by an organist and/or pianist and a cantor. Over 80 Masses per year feature percussion, and around 150 enlist choral support, courtesy of our four adult and three children's choirs.

As the ubiquitous late-night commercial says, "But wait...there's more!"

Between 30 and 50 weddings and an equal number of funerals take place within our walls annually, as well as monthly communal baptism services and Masses and prayer services held by our St. Ignatius Grammar School, IREP, and neighboring schools such as Regis and Loyola. Over 90% of these services are staffed or contracted by a member of the music staff.



Robert Busiakiewicz, Director of Music at St. James Cathedral in Toronto, in a brilliant article called "Does Church Music represent value-formoney?" (find it at *https://stjamescathedral.ca/value-church-music/*), makes a few cogent points:

Music is the best evangelist in an increasingly secular world. We live in an age in which eternal values are given less bandwidth than ever and religion plays a smaller role in life and culture than it used to. However, music often provides the initial impetus for many who are seeking a deeper relationship with God and eventually find their way into our community. He goes on to say that "excellent art music in liturgy is a proven catalyst for a profound home-coming."

Interacting with art is a fundamental part of what it means to be human. It is easy to want the liturgy to work its magic on us, thereby relieving ourselves of the burden of meaningful engagement. This is a call into active participation rather than passivity. Music gives us a rich avenue through which we interact with each other and our Creator, through word and sacrament.

Great art can be hard to understand. That does not make it invalid. Think of the things in your life that add the most value to your existence, and perhaps give you a reason to get out of bed every morning. Were any of them easy to come by? There is a popular (some might say populist) idea that great art is elitist and out of touch with reality. Those who believe this have simply not yet experienced the immeasurable joys of losing oneself in the act of plumbing the depths of a great book, painting, or piece of music whereby the artist, in the act of creating, seems to channel the mind of God. This experience is available to every single one of us, regardless of our education or intellectual capabilities. Once we allow ourselves to be broken open in this way, we are changed forever.

Christian art is resistant to ideas of monetary value. Putting a price on transcendent history requires great humility. While it is importive that our institutions remain solvent, it is impossible to quantify the intangible effects that art, music, and liturgy have on our hearts, minds, and community. Busiakiewicz further states: "To survive we require *logos*, planning, and responsibility. To thrive we require mystical story-telling, *pathos*, and an openness to irrational sublimity courting the slippery side of subjectivism."

I leave you with words of D. H. Lawrence (again, courtesy of the well-read Mr. Busiakiewicz):

The essential function of art is moral. Not aesthetic, not decorative, not pastime and recreation. But moral. A morality which changes the blood, rather than the mind. The mind follows later, in the wake.


