"Something Happened"

alcolm Gladwell, Canadian journalist and author, is host to the podcast, "Revisionist History." In a recent threeepisode series dedicated to the way Jesuits think (*mirabile dictu*!), he examines a process by which we arrive at moral decisions. This process is called "casuistry."

Gladwell says he has "fallen in love with" casuistry, which the Jesuits of the sixteenth century introduced to the taxonomy of moral debate. Casuistry, very different from sophistry, is the method of problem-solving that does not start from general principles or universal laws, but instead begins with a particular case and then extracts from the general what is applicable to the particular. In this way, the general principle is stretched.

This method was particularly useful to the Jesuits who faced entirely novel situations as they travelled the world and opened



schools and confronted new cultures and philosophies. Saint Ignatius, in his letters to Jesuits preparing to embark on a new mission—in Paris or Penang—gave detailed instructions on how to proceed according to the rules and spirit of the new Order. Invariably, at the end of those letters, he would write, "These instructions are to be followed, unless the particular situation of persons or places counsels otherwise." Novel situations cannot be legislated for; general laws arise from past situations. As Gladwell comments, "If you're out on the road, thousands of miles from Rome, encountering new people and new things, you start to think differently. How could you not?" Gladwell goes to Rome and speaks with revered Jesuit professor of moral theology, Fr. James Keenan, S.J., who elaborates.

"Casuistry come from the Latin word *casus*, 'something happened.' You give a case, which is a narrative. You say, 'something happened." One poignant example of a "new thing" was the Jesuit mission to Elizabethan England, where obeying the eternal divine commandment, Thou Shalt Not Lie, would bring dire consequences. "If you arrive in England," says Keenan, "and you tell the soldier you are a priest, you're going to be dead." Is it moral to lie, when asked if you are a Catholic, when answering truthfully means death? The Jesuits concluded that when it comes to new problems, you can't start by appealing to a principle; principles don't help. When you are in uncharted territory, you have to proceed on a case-by-case basis.

Can this methodological insight serve us in the interpretation and application of law in the Church? It is actually right at home in the Church!

The nature of law in the Church, whether it be natural law, revealed divine law, or merely ecclesiastical disciplinary laws, derives from the nature of the Church. The Church, as the People of God, as the Mystical Body of Christ, as the Universal Sacrament of Salvation, as a community formed by the action of the Holy Spirit, has as its principal analogue the Incarnate Word, not civil society. Law in the Church, part of the sacramental reality that is the Church, cannot but have the same purpose and intent as the Church Herself, that is, the salvation of souls. The last canon in the *Code of Canon Law* states, "[The prescriptions of these laws] are to be applied...having before one's eyes the salvation of souls, which is always the supreme law of the Church" (canon 1752). I might say, "...of ALL these laws."

Jesus asks a teacher of the law, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" (Lk. 10:26). If we are prepared to welcome a better righteousness than the Pharisees, if we are to pray not only for the external order and peace of the community, but also for an interior reality which is, by the work of the Spirit, communion with God and communion with one another, we do well to know the universal principles, but to ask first, "What happened?"


