Those Who Have Gone Before Us

ext Sunday we put daylight saving time to rest until next April, and ever so slowly the days become shorter. Our 2019 calendars will also get slimmer this coming Friday as November arrives with the feast of All Saints, followed by the feast of All Souls on Saturday. With the coming of November, the Church begins to think about endings—the ending of the Church's liturgical year on November 30th, the ending that is death itself, and the death of all those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith.

The feasts of All Saints and All Souls are among the best reminders we have of the Church's ancient teaching on the communion of saints, a teaching we profess belief in whenever we recite the Apostles Creed. By the communion of saints we understand that there is a vital unity, a strong bond, among God's faithful people. All who share the one spirit through baptism are one single body in Christ: the faithful who make up the Church on earth, all the saints in heaven, and all the dead who have not yet come to the bliss of heaven.

This one body is the Church. This was St. Paul's great insight. His concept of the Church as the Body of Christ goes back to the memory of his own conversion to faith in Jesus and to the words spoken to him at his conversion: "Iam Jesus who you are persecuting." This implies that Christians are identified with the risen Christ. In Paul's writings, Christians are united with the risen

Christ by baptism and the Eucharist which make them parts of Christ's body united in such a way that He and they form together the Body of Christ, the Church.

This coming Friday we single out a special grouping in the Church. On that day we honor the most distinguished assembly of people who could ever come together in one place: all the saints in the Christian Church, from Saints Peter and Paul in the first century to recently canonized saints such as Mother Teresa of Calcutta, Padre Pio, Kathryn Drexel, and Oscar Romero.

If we look closely at all of them we would see a very diversified group of men and women, young and old, married and single, from rich and poor families, from the big cities and small towns. They came from different social and educational backgrounds, and had different temperaments and different talents. And to our surprise, perhaps, we would see that all of them were very human. They had their limitations and imperfections. They struggled to know God's will for them. They lost their temper and became discouraged. They all sinned and grieved over their sins. They became saints partly by wanting to be saints, but not because they were not tempted to be less.

Immediately after All Saints day, we single out another grouping in the Church: all the deceased faithful who are not yet enjoying the face-to-face vision of God. On this coming Saturday, the Church on earth says to this group: We want to help you by our prayers and good works to enter into the blessedness of the saints. One of the principal ways we do this is by praying for the dead, especially through the Mass. Every time a Mass is offered anywhere in the world there are specific prayers for the dead. The assumption is that your prayers and mine can make a difference for them. The Second Vatican Council taught in its Dogmatic Constitution on the Church that, "very much aware of the bonds linking together the whole Mystical Body of Christ, the pilgrim Church from the very first ages of the Christian religion has cultivated with great piety the memory of the dead and has offered prayers for them."

The coming month of November with its longer and darker nights will hopefully serve to unite us more intentionally with all the dead—with the saints and the not-yet saints—who have gone before us into the night of death believing in a life that lasts forever. Death is not the end of life. And it need not be the end of a relationship with our loved ones. It becomes a matter of finding them in a new way.



In *The Cloister* by James Carroll, Father Michael Kavanagh is shocked to see a friend from his

seminary days named Runner Malloy at the altar of his humble Inwood community parish. Wondering about their past, he wanders into the The Cloisters, and begins a conversation with a museum guide, Rachel Vedette.

Rachel, a scholar of medieval history, has retreated to The Cloisters after her harrowing experience as a Jewish woman in France during the Holocaust. She ponders her late father's greatest intellectual work: a study demonstrating the relationship between the famously discredited monk Peter Abelard and Jewish scholars. Something about Father Kavanagh makes Rachel think he might appreciate her continued studies, and she shares with him the work that cost her father his life.

At the center of these interrelated stories is the classic romance between the great scholar Peter Abelard and his intellectual equal Heloise.
