Consolations and Desolations in Jesuit Higher Education Today

he first of the universal apostolic preferences the Jesuits adopted this year is entitled "Showing the Way to God." It entails a special focus on the Spiritual Exercises and discernment. Explaining these concepts, leaders in the Society of Jesus stressed accompanying people who are discerning complex choices in increasingly globalized economic and political arenas, as well as promoting deeper study of the Exercises and offering a more nuanced approach to secularism.

All of these desiderata are closely bound up with the mission of Jesuit colleges and universities in this complex period through which all of us are living. Jesuits, of course, have long been associated with education. They established their first college in Messina, Sicily, in 1548, and today, there are nearly two hundred such institutions around the world. And that's not to mention the primary, middle, and secondary schools that the Society sponsors in more than seventy countries, collectively educating more than 800,000 students annually.

Here in the U.S., it's increasingly being said that higher education is at a crossroads. Surveys indicate that larger and larger numbers of citizens—all across the political spectrum—no longer value colleges and universities as once they did, whether



out of concern that elite institutions reproduce social privilege, or that a college education does not prepare young people for a rapidly changing workforce, or that universities "coddle" their students by sheltering them from unwelcome ideas and life's tough realities. These critiques come at a time when student debt has increased by more than a third since 2014, now totaling more than \$1.4 trillion, and when more than half of students currently enrolled report experiencing overwhelming anxiety and other mental health challenges. These and other factors, including demographic changes, the emergence of online and other non-traditional forms of learning, and the closure of some

institutions, have created something of a perfect storm for U.S. colleges and universities.

What do Ignatian spirituality and the habit of discernment have to offer Jesuit institutions as we address such tensions? This Monday evening, November 4th, I'll have the privilege of delivering the first in this year's series of parish lectures at St. Ignatius Loyola. I'll begin by charting some of the consolations and desolations that those of us who have the privilege of working in Jesuit higher education experience on a daily, weekly, and annual basis.

The techniques that come down to us through the Ignatian spiritual tradition offer opportunities for Jesuit institutions to accompany our students, faculty members, staff, alumni/ae and others in meaningful ways. In my talk, I'll be examining how Ignatius's insistence on the importance of imagination dovetails not only with the way Jesuit colleges and universities help form our students but also with cutting-edge research on the transformation of large human institutions. I'll be asking how Jesuit schools today might emulate the entrepreneurial, risk-taking behavior of the first colleges and universities that the Society established. And I'll be asking what about the Spiritual Exercises might inspire all of us as we make our way in a world, and a public square, that is rife with confrontation, name-calling, and sometimes, it seems, anything but nuance and empathy.

Jesuit colleges and universities have thrived down the centuries because they have not feared, but instead embraced, the complexities of the world as it is. Likewise, in today's fraught moment in the human story, Jesuit institutions have an opportunity to deploy our tradition for the common good. I'm eager to talk with members of the Saint Ignatius Loyola community about what it might look like for us to seize this chance.


