Angels, Agents of Transformation

My depression deepened unbearably and finally it seemed to me as though I were at the bottom of the pit. I still gagged badly on the notion of a Power greater than myself, but finally, just for the moment, the last vestige of my proud obstinacy was crushed.

All at once I found myself crying out, "If there is a God, let Him show Himself! I am ready to do anything, anything!" Suddenly the room lit up with a great white light. I was caught up into an ecstasy which there are no words to describe. It seemed to me, in my mind's eye, that I was on a mountain and that a wind not of air but of spirit was blowing.

And then it burst upon me that I was a free man.

This is how "Bill W", the founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, described his "hot flash" spiritual conversion. Bill was in Towns Hospital, then located on Central Park West, for his last detox – his wife was resolved to have him committed should he relapse. Though he felt himself to be at a desperate, hopeless dead-end, an invisible yet tangible messenger pierced the veil, radically transforming Bill's life, and by extension countless other lives. Our ancestors in faith attributed experiences like this to angels.

While the angelic might appear dramatically, as with Bill W, most of us will be invited to receive these messengers in subtle, quiet ways. We will be touched by angels through others who enter our lives at just the right moment with guidance and wisdom. Perhaps there will be a dream that gives us clarity and new direction through arresting symbolism. The angelic might communicate through synchronicities: when we seem to encounter a certain theme, word, or image recurring everywhere, we sense that it is all more than coincidence. Deep intuitions that are impossible to ignore also serve to guide, warn, and teach us as well.

Angels are active during "in between" times in both biblical stories and the experiences of people like Bill W. When we reach life's thresholds, when faced with consequential choices, there is a power available to us independent of the ego, a power of otherworldly wisdom and gentle guidance. We are collectively passing through an "in between" time now as we endure COVID-19, social turmoil, and political transition. In the coming months it is likely that pandemic will gradually end, God willing, and our politics will regain a semblance of stability. History will invite us to draw wisdom from these turbulent times as we make decisions about what kind of people, nation and church we want to be. Such are the junctures when the angelic is most available to us, if we are discerning and humbly open to its guidance.
